



# Interesting best practice on-camera ideas for big police Department

Police departments can boost engagement, trust, and recruitment by using a range of on-camera best practices that prioritize authenticity, transparency, and educational value for their videos and live appearances.<sup>[1] [2]</sup>

## Community Engagement and Transparency

- Feature officers in everyday settings to let viewers see the human side of policing, such as ride-alongs, behind-the-scenes tours, and community events.<sup>[2] [3]</sup>
- Address misconceptions directly with videos or livestreams that explain department processes and policies, ideally allowing for audience questions and feedback.<sup>[1]</sup>
- Host virtual town halls and recruiting chats where the public can interact directly with officers and leadership, fostering open dialogue and providing clarity about departmental operations.<sup>[4] [5]</sup>

## Educational and Safety-Focused Content

- Produce educational videos that inform the public about safety tips, legal rights, and response strategies during emergencies, positioning the department as a community resource.<sup>[2] [1]</sup>
- Use video content to demonstrate positive police-citizen interactions and model best practices in communication, helping to reinforce departmental values and expectations.<sup>[6] [7]</sup>

## Storytelling and Recruitment Ideas

- Highlight officer stories — their backgrounds, motivations, and experiences — to attract diverse candidates and build empathy within the community.<sup>[5]</sup>
- Create bite-sized, shareable social media videos that show officers involved in fun, lighthearted activities or community service, building relatability and positive sentiment.<sup>[5]</sup>

## Video Production and Professionalism Tips

- Ensure video content supports an overall engagement strategy and has a clear theme or “hook” to capture audience attention early.<sup>[2]</sup>
- Use good lighting, quality audio, and a teleprompter when appropriate for scripted segments. Avoid jargon and speak in an approachable, active voice.<sup>[2]</sup>

- Remember to act professionally at all times, even in candid moments, as “always on camera” is the new default for law enforcement interactions. [8]

## Successful Formats and Ideas

Video Format	Description/Use
Ride-along videos	Gives authentic view of an officer’s work
Recruitment Q&A	Answers real applicant or community queries
Officer profile stories	Shares personal backgrounds to inspire trust
Community tip solicitations	Crowd-sources public help on cases
Safety/reform explainers	Tutorials on law, policy, and department values
